Motor vehicle laws vary from state to state.

There are legal consequences for texting while driving. Consequences include traffic tickets, fines, loss of driving license/permit and even jail time.

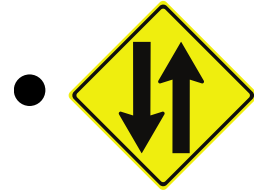
Data shows 19% of 15- to 18-year-old passenger vehicle drivers involved in fatal crashes in 2021 had been drinking.

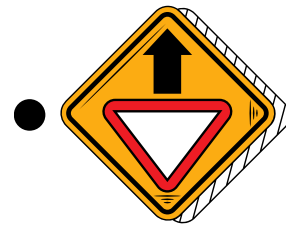

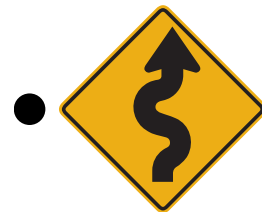

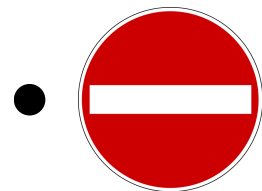

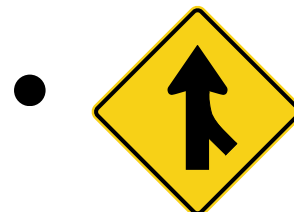

Drugs and alcohol can cause impaired driving.
Can you decode the anagrams below to decode some of the most commonly abused substances?

1 collaho

__alcohol__

Colorless volatile flammable liquid that is produced through the fermentation of sugars. Used in wine, beer, spirits, and is also used as an industrial solvent and as fuel.

2 anniabcs

Greenish-gray mixture of dried, shredded leaves, stems, seeds, and/or flowers; resin (hashish) or sticky, black liquid (hash oil)

3 nbozse

Medications that slow brain activity, which makes them useful for treating anxiety and sleep problems.

4 aceconi

A powerfully addictive stimulant drug made from the leaves of the coca plant native to South America. Common forms include white powder or rock crystal.

5 ashlintan

Found in various household products including Paint thinners or removers, gasoline, lighter fluids, permanent markers, glue...etc.

- Impaired judgment and coordination

- Nausea and vomiting

2 heroine

- Euphoria
- Altered sense of time
- Bloodshot eyes
- Increased heart rate

3 alcohol

- Intense euphoria
- Increased energy and alertness
- Constricted blood vessels
- Dilated pupils

4 cocaine

- Increased wakefulness and physical activity
- Decreased appetite
- Rapid heart rate
- Agitation and irritability

5 methamphetamine

- Rush of euphoria
- Warm flushing of the skin
- Heavy feeling in the arms and legs
- Clouded mental functioning
